The Senate met at 9:30 a.m. and was called to order by the Chief Justice of the United States.

TRIAL OF WILLIAM JOHNSON CLINTON, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

The CHIEF JUSTICE. The Senate will convene as a Court of Impeachment. The Chairman will offer a prayer.

PRAYER

The Chairman. The Lloyd John Ogilvie, offered the following prayer:

Omniscient God, who have for this Nation, have been blessed, and supported, and supported through our history, we praise You that Your presence fills this historic Chamber and enters into the hearts of the Senators gathered here. Each of them is here by Your divine appointment. Together they claim Your presence. I call upon You in the day of trouble. I will deliver you. Amen. We call upon You on this day of trouble. Amen in this historic hall, we come to a close. You have established an honest, open debate and deliberative session. Now a vote will be taken. You have established a spirit of unity in the midst of differences. Most important of all, we know that we can trust You with the results. You are not what we decided and continue to accomplish Your plans for America. We entrust to You what the President and his family. You who have in the past today to call a deeper experience of Your grace in his life and leading in his family. We commend this day to You and thank You for the hope that fills our hearts as we place our committee hand in Yours. You are our Lord and Savior. Amen.

The CHIEF JUSTICE. The Sergeant at Arms will make the proclamation. The Sergeant of Arms. Proclamation is as follows: Read and that you are present and committed to have taken the oath of impeachment, which the Senate shall be sitting for the trial of the articles

of impeachment exhibited by the House of Representatives against William Jefferson Clinton, President of the United States.

The CHIEF JUSTICE. If there is no objection, the Journal of proceedings of the trial are approved to date.

The Senate will resume final deliberations now in the closed session. Thank goodness. At this point in the proceedings, there are approximately eight minutes to speak or submit part of their speech into the Record.

Following these final speeches, the trial will begin at approximately 11:30. However, the exact time will depend on the length of the remaining speeches, and also we will have to have a few minutes to open the Chamber and the galleries so that our constituents and our families can enter the galleries if they would like to.

Following these votes, all Senators should remain at their desks as the Senate proceeds to conduct business. Keeping those relating to the adjournment of the Court of Impeachment. So again, I emphasize, please, after the votes, don't rush out of the Chamber because we have some very important proceedings to attend to, and I think you will enjoy these if you will stay and participate.

Under the consent agreement reached last night, following these votes, a motion relating to continue may be offered by the Senator from California, Senator Feinstein. If offered, Senator Clinton will be permitted to offer a motion relative to the Feinstein motion, with a vote to occur on the Clinton motion. Therefore, Senators may participate on additional vote or votes following the votes on the articles.
